



A well-functioning property tax is the foundation of municipal fiscal health for rapidly growing cities worldwide—a pillar in the implementation of the New Urban Agenda. The property tax is a stable source of own-source revenue that promotes greater self-sufficiency in the delivery of basic services, augmented by intergovernmental transfers.

The discussion at this side event—based on our work as co-authors, with the World Bank, on the Habitat III Policy Paper Framework: Municipal Finance and Local Fiscal Systems—will cover challenges and opportunities in establishing and maintaining property tax systems in the U.S., Latin America, Africa, and China.






